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### Now Two Well-Working Disposal Options

Especially when we're away from home, how to dispose of our used ostomy appliances is a legitimate concern. We want disposal to be discrete and odor controlled. There are two products that can be of great help. One is already on the market, the Ostaway X-Bag (shown below) and soon to be available, OstoSolutions Lids.



As X-Bag's website states, "The x-Bag is the ultimate Ostomy Device Disposal Bag. The x-Bag is leak proof, odor reducing, and totally content concealing. The x-Bag's ez-zip seal allows you to quickly dispose of your used ostomy bag with one sweeping hand movement. Its specially designed light absorbing film gives you 100% invisibility of content and is whisper-quiet when you need to be discreet. The x-Bag is designed to be compatible with all major brands of ostomy bags and devices including ConvaTec, Colo- life for a person living with an ostomy: they often plast, Cymed, and Hollister. Whether you need to dispose of your used colostomy bags, ileostomy bags,

or other ostomy supplies, the x-Bag will do the job right. Get the x-Bag right now, and make your disposal problems simply disappear."

BagItAway is available at BagItAway.com or by phone at 800-774-6097. Cost for 100 zip lock bags is \$25.97 or \$14.97 for 50. Free samples are also available. Your editor takes them along whenever she travels for peace of mind.

BOA's Medical Advisory Board Member Mary Lou Boyer, CWOCN, brought to our attention a soon to be available alternative, OstoSolutions, as shown below.



Mary Lou writes, "Many colostomy patients are introduced to drainable pouches shortly before being discharged from the hospital. Cost, insurance limitations, or simply routine practice may be reasons that the benefits of using closed-end pouches are often not fully explored.

One other reason: disposal concerns centered on odor. Recently, I was introduced to a product soon to be on the market, developed by a person living an ostomy, which provides ostomates with an odorproof way to dispose of used pouches: a simple, easy to use lid that seals the used pouch (both closed-end and drainable pouches with "clipless" Velcro tail closure on their last use).

Odor concerns have a direct impact on quality of find themselves in places where changing their pouch can be very uncomfortable and embarrassing. Even worse, odor concerns mean that many just avoid

doing activities or going places that they enjoyed prior to having an ostomy. The seemingly simple ability to change and seal a used pouch for disposal in less than twenty seconds, then dispose of it in an odor-free manner, without the need of a toilet, can be life-changing.

The lid will be available soon from OstoSolutions. You'll be able to find out more about it, as well as read the story of the company's founder, who has an ostomy, and request samples as soon as the website goes live in late spring 2013. Wendy introduced Rob Seaman who's represented ConvaTec for the past 28 years. Rob assists our group in many, many ways for which we are extremely grateful and gives us a fresh presentation each year. He briefly review some of ConvaTec's history, the company was founded in 1978 and is now in 90 countries around the world. ConvaTec employs over 8,000 people worldwide. ConvaTec's Mission Statement is that with imagination and innovation we make a difference in people's lives.

Rob encouraged people to join the online Ostomy Support Group offered by Inspire. It's a peer to peer group for patients, families, friends and caregivers sponsored by Great Comebacks. The Great Comebacks® program which began in 1984 is designed to raise awareness that people who have had ostomy surgery can lead full, productive and inspirational lives. You can nominate yourself or someone you know for the Great Comebacks Award and our own Wendy is a previous Award winner.

ConvaTec Concierge™ Service is a hospital discharge program to provide resources, education, and patient support throughout the discharge process. Intended for healthcare professionals. It provides information on the fundamentals of ostomy management. The service links hospitals and nurses to ConvaTec. Healthcare professionals can order the free ConvaTec Starter Kit™ as part of a customized patient care plan. It includes free product samples to start the patients off. ConvaTec also offers a Patient Assistance Program which provides ostomy supplies for financially eligible and uninsured patients on a temporary basis. ConvaTec has a toll free phone number, 800-442-8811, for their Customer Interaction Center with Certified Wound Ostomy nurses who support over 70 languages. They receive thousands of calls and are open Monday through Friday 9

Ren handed out samples of Securi-T™ Hydrocolloid Skin Barrier Strips. Also handed out were SafeN' Simple™ peri-Stoma & Adhesive Remover Wipes which Wendy suggests to keep in your car for unexpected leaks. Sample bottles of Na 'Scent ostomy odor control were also given out at each table. It is an odor control liquid that eliminates odor-causing microbes in the pouch. Another item displayed by Mary Lou Boyer, CWOCN, was a cap that seals off the open end of a closed-end pouch for disposal.

Mary Lou recently retired from Cleveland Clinic Florida, but remains active on our BOA Medical Board. Today she demonstrated how to use the Sure Seal™ Rings for ostomy flanges. She said these will help to secure two-piece wafers while swimming, etc.

Wendy discussed the Ostaway x-Bag from BagIt-Away.com for disposal of used ostomy pouches and contents. They are opaque zip lock bags useful in concealing used ostomy supplies and contents when changing or emptying your pouch in a public place. No need to shock the hotel maid by placing contents in a see-through plastic bag when the x-Bag is much more discrete. You can travel and go out in public and have a wonderful life.

Internationally known motivational speaker Joachim de Posada has been helping Wendy's sister Pam acquire venues to give lectures on boating.

Vice President and Programming Chair Amy introduced today's speaker, Dr. Nicholas Masi, retired Director of Patient and Family-Centered Care at Memorial and Joe DiMaggio Children's Hospital. In 1994 Drs. Nick and Wendy Masi were founding members of Gilda's Club South Florida, a support group for women, men, children and teens with all types of cancer. It was dedicated to the memory of Christina Perez and Dr. Masi's daughter Jennifer.

Dr. Masi is also a founding member of Florida's Camp Boggy Creek. It is modeled after Paul Newman's Hole in the Wall Gang Camp in Connecticut where children coping with serious illnesses can have a time and place where they can simply be kids.

Dr. Masi learned a lot as the father of two daughters with cancer, about the necessity of involving all

family members in healthcare decisions. In his 50's, Dr. Masi was diagnosed with anal cancer. He followed actress Farrah Fawcett's similar and public struggle with anal cancer and treatment and decided that if she could do it, he could too. But to be sure, he got a 2nd, 3rd and 4th opinion on treatment. Ultimately, he had surgery, radiation treatment and chemotherapy and has a colostomy. Through his own and his daughters' experiences he learned how to effectively complain and advocate.

Dr. Masi's brought Patient and Family-Centered Care (PFCC) to the Memorial Healthcare System. PFCC is partnering parents and families with the medical care staff. PFCC includes respecting patients' cultural traditions, personal preferences and values; giving patients and their families the opportunity to make choices about their care; involving patients and their loved ones as part of the healthcare team; giving responsibility to patients and family for important aspects of self-care and monitoring the patient's needs, along with providing the tools and support to meet those needs. PFCC means striving to ensure that transitions between providers goes smoothly and without error. It also means collecting and utilizing input from Patient and Family Advisory Councils.

A Patient and Family Resource Center is open at Memorial Regional. It includes a Welcome Center with information about hotels, restaurants, stores, laundry services, transportation, banks and places of worship close to the hospital. They have telephones, fax and Internet access for family members to continue their work and lives while at the hospital. They provide support group information and information on specific health conditions. There is also very important information about preventing the spread of infections while in the hospital.

In conclusion, Wendy presented Dr. Masi with a LED toggle light and a Certificate of Appreciation on behalf of the BOA. The meeting was concluded at 2:35 p.m.

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a.m. to 5 p.m. A WOC nurse will follow up by phone with patients who receive the starter kit.

Rob discussed recent innovations at ConvaTec such as Moldable Technology™ skin barriers which are especially useful if you have an irregular shaped stoma. The pliable adhesive rolls open to fit the desired stoma size and shape with no cutting necessary. Moldable wafers do not replace the Eakin Cohesive® seals but work in conjunction with them. Moldable wafers only come with two-piece appliances.

He discussed Natura+® pouches and Esteem Synergy® two-piece products that have Adhesive Coupling Technology where instead of plastic rings, a foam adhesive allows the pouch to be securely attached to the skin barrier on a clear plastic "Landing Zone" flange. Esteem- InvisiClose® clipless tail closure with redesigned deodorizing filters for extended use. Pouches are tested on a constantly

shaking wall for durability and temperature tolerance.

Rob discussed ConvaTec Sensi-Care® Products that help manage sensitive skin compromised by exposure to caustic stool residue. In 2012, ConvaTec acquired Trio Healthcare and added two of their products to their lineup: the sting free medical adhesive remover Niltac™ (highly recommended by your editor) that leaves no residue and the Silesse™ sting free skin barrier.

After a question and answer session, Wendy thanked Rob and presented him with a gift LED light and a box of trail mix. Leroy was thanked again for providing the sandwich spread. The meeting was concluded at 2:30 p.m.
