Rob Seaman promised L.T. his speaker's brownies and Wendy gave him a book about ostomates and dating. L.T. presented a slide show of his 2011-2012 school year.

Wendy introduced Mr. (Wonderful) Rob Seaman, our representative from ConvaTec and a dear friend, as today's guest speaker. Rob has made many generous donations to the Broward Ostomy Association. Rob said it is we who inspire him, and that Wendy was a regional Great Comebacks® Award winner not too long ago.

Rob began his presentation with a video: Great Comebacks® Shining Bright. The beautiful video showcased various people with ostomies on their road to recovery and success. The Great Comebacks® Awards program has been ongoing for 26 years.

Rob presented a timeline of ConvaTec's history of innovation, beginning in 1978 when it was founded as a division of E. R. Squibb & Sons and was the first

to have a 2-piece closed-end and drainable ostomy management system. The timeline showed many milestones in ostomy product development up to the present day.

Some of the ConvaTec products discussed included SUR-FIT Natura® Moldable Skin Barrier with Rebounding Memory Technology™ on which the opening is rolled open with your fingers to fit around your stoma and is not cut with scissors. Rob also spoke of new ConvaTec Plus drainable pouches with new filters to reduce clogging and InvisiClose® Tail Closure with fewer snaps to close. Rob showed a testing facility with machines that put pouches through a rigorous workout to ensure their durability.

For those with Internet access, Rob recommended the website www.Ostomy.inspire.com which connects patients, families, friends and caregivers for support and inspiration and is sponsored by Great Comebacks[®].

ConvaTec also provides a Starter Kit Program[™] for new patients that can be tailored to their individual needs as they leave the hospital. Each person in the program will receive a call from a WOC nurse to talk about the kit and follow up on product application needs. Typically, a nurse will call within the 1st week you are home. ConvaTec has over 20 WOCNs on call thru their customer interaction services, who speak about 72 different languages. This is especially important in areas that don't have local WOCN access.

Through the ConvaTec Ostomy Access Program®, ConvaTec provides ostomy supplies to financially eligible patients on a temporary basis, at no charge. Patients who are uninsured and are unable to afford the cost of the Ostomy supplies may be eligible. For more information contact ConvaTec's Customer Interaction Center at 1-800-422-8811.

Wendy and the membership thanked Rob for his very informative visit, and stated that this was the largest turnout we've ever had for a June meeting. Product Review ~ Belts

Why might an ostomate choose to wear an ostomy belt? There are both medically necessary reasons as well as mere personal preferences. Let's look at both.

It might be necessary to wear an ostomy belt if your stoma protrudes only to skin level or very little at all. First try using skin barrier wafers with convexity to see if that solves the problem of having to change too frequently due to output flowing under your wafer onto your skin. If convexity is not enough try wearing a belt that pushes the wafer even farther into your body, forcing the stoma to slightly protrude. Be very careful not to wear the

School of Medicine. His presentation was titled "Radical Cystectomy in Elderly Patients."

Dr. Manoharan specializes in treating bladder cancer, occurrences of which peak after age 70. There are over 55,000 new cases of bladder cancer each year, and about 15,000 deaths. Bladder cancer is the 5th leading cause of cancer deaths in octogenarians. There has been an increase in diagnosed cases because people live longer, seek healthcare in a timely fashion, and have issues detected sooner due to better screening processes. The doctor learns much from patients and their families, including important social things about their way of life. The goals of his practice are to cure the cancer, reduce complications and improve his patient's quality of life.

For surgery to be beneficial for a patient, each has to be chosen with regard to other health issues such as atherosclerosis, coronary artery disease, cerebral vascular incidence and anesthetic risks. In most cases, removal of the bladder offers the best cure for bladder cancer. Surgery for bladder removal, called a cystectomy, has a mortality rate that is less than 2%.

A cystectomy requires a urinary diversion. Such surgeries may include construction of a neobladder from a section of intestine that is reshaped into a new bladder. In cases where a urostomy is required, an ileal conduit must be constructed from the kidneys to a stoma where urine is collected in an appliance. In other cases a Continence Pouch may be shaped from portions of stomach or intestine and remain inside the abdomen.

The SEER Database (Surveillance Epidemiology and End Results) by the National Cancer Institute is a good source for cancer statistics and an analysis of patient outcomes from bladder surgery. The majority of patients report that life gets better and happier as time goes by after their surgery.

At the conclusion of Dr. Manoharan's part of today's program, Amy presented him with speaker's brownies and a Certificate of Appreciation signed by Wendy Lueder.

Amy next introduced the second speaker of the day, Dr. Manoharan's Certified Physician's Assistant Claudia Guzman, who spoke on the topic of

caring for the issues that bring patients back to the office. As a Physician's Assistant, she often spends more time than the surgeon with patients discussing health, social, and quality of life issues.

Claudia addressed both short and long term problems patients may have after a radical cystectomy. In the short term after surgery issues that may occur include wound infection, stoma leakage, appliance issues, and trouble adapting to a wafer. The stoma may protrude, contract, or prolapse. Depression is a very life challenging issue that must be addressed. Then there is fatigue, changes in body image, vitamin deficiencies, and issues with blood tests, sexual function, and bowel irregularity. It is important to determine how a person lived before surgery to know what expectations they may have after surgery.

Long term issues include stoma stenosis, parastomal hernia, ureter narrowing, and scar tissue formation which can block kidney function. It is most important to detect kidney function change and to prevent damage and kidney failure. Urinary tract infections are common in patients, and symptoms after a cystectomy may be different in a patient than before surgery. Patients may lack the sensation that normally accompanies such infections and instead must be aware of changes in smell, back pain, fever or cloudy urine. Patients are followed up at 3 months, then 6, and finally at 12 months if everything is stable.

At the conclusion of Claudia's presentation, Amy presented her with speaker's brownies and a Certificate of Appreciation for her valuable time and information.

Amy pointed out that today's speakers were recommended by members who were their patients. If you know a doctor or other professional who would make a good program for our Ostomy group, please contact Amy. She will be asking for your specific input on programming at future meetings. Our guest speaker on November 4th will be returning colon & rectal surgeon Dr. Henry Wodnicki. On December 2nd we will hold our annual Holiday Candlelight Buffer Dinner with featured speaker Dr. Joachim de Posada, CSP.

In other business, first time visitors were welcomed including Arlene and her husband Arnie, Justin from

belt too tightly as this may cause damage. Just a slight tug may make all the difference. Another ostomate successfully used wearing a belt during the healing process of her skin that was damaged caused by the output from a leak. Without the belt she found it necessary to change her wafer every day. When she started wearing a belt she got back up to her normal five day wear time while her skin was in the healing process.

For just personal preference, wearing a belt may give you an added extra sense of security. One of our members who is an avid swimmer feels more secure in the pool doing laps while wearing a belt.

If your stoma protrudes a half inch or more and your skin is in good condition you probably do not need to wear a belt. I can assure you from personal experience that not wearing a belt is far more comfortable.

Now if you do choose to wear one, which one to try? The good news is that both ConvaTec's and Hollister's belts work well with each other's pouches. The

tab holes and tabs are different shapes as seen in the photos but easily accommodate each other.

Here are some differences. Hollister's belt is fleshtone and a bit wider than ConvaTec's. Being wider distributes the "pull" of the belt over a larger skin surface thus making it a bit more comfortable. ConvaTec's is white. If you have difficulty in using your hands Hollister's tab holes are a bit easier to attach. If you choose to wear a belt, why not try both and see what's best for you.
