Juan J. Nogueras, MD, FACS, FASCRS, is Chief of Staff at Cleveland Clinic Florida, Weston, and was Chairman of the Division of Surgery from 2000 to 2008. He has been on Staff as a Colorectal Surgeon since 1991. Dr. Nogueras' treatment interests include colon and rectal cancer, inherited colorectal cancer, Crohn's disease, ulcerative colitis, diverticulitis, fecal incontinence, benign anorectal diseases and colonoscopy. He is certified by the American Board of Surgery and the American Board of Colon and Rectal Surgery. Dr. Nogueras was appointed Chief Medical Officer in 2008, and Chief of Staff in 2010.

Dr. Nogueras received his undergraduate education at Princeton University in Princeton, N.J., and his medical degree from Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia. He completed his internship and residency in general surgery at Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center in New York City and a fellowship in colon and rectal surgery at the University of Minnesota in Minneapolis.

Dr. Gross received his BA in Psychology, Magna Cum Laude, from the University of Rochester, an MD from the University of Florida and Psychiatric Residency at Yale University. He is honored to be the Medical Director of the Center for the Treatment of Anxiety and Mood Disorders of Delray Beach, composed of a multidisciplinary team providing multimodality treatment for a wide range of disorders. He is also the Founder of The Children's Center, a unique clinical setting that permits the comprehensive evaluation and treatment of children/adolescent mental health problems under one roof.

Minutes General Meeting December 4, 2016

Leroy catered the delicious buffet which proved to be his most exquisite meal yet. He graciously accepted the beautiful poinsettia provided by Amparo Cano, CWOC nurse who always goes above and beyond for her patients as well as all members of the BOA.



New attendees were introduced: Bill with his friend Ryan, Mike, and Kent's sister.

Irwin, the Master of Ceremonies, is an integral part of the BOA as he pays for all the postage for sending out the editions of the *Broward Beacon* by snail mail.

The Installation Ceremony rounded out the evening. Krysta was gracious enough to accept the corresponding secretary position. Richard offered to be a new greeter at the hospitality table. All other volunteers were thanked for the faithful service as well: Emma, Larry, and Darryel for refreshments for the monthly meetings, Reggie for all the extras he provides, Cliff and Mom who are faithful in ensuring the room is prepared for the monthly meetings, Kent reaching out to first time visitors. Amy agreed to continue being Vice President, Ren agreed to Treasurer, Wendy agreed to President, and Debbie to recording secretary for another year.

Other faithful sponsors were thanked: Julie from Ostomy Inc., John from Hollister, and Rob from ConvaTec.

Minutes General Meeting February 5, 2017

The meeting was called to order at 1:30 pm at Memorial Regional Hospital's Main Auditorium in Hollywood, Florida. The Ostomate's Prayer was read by Larry. Emma and Fred were thanked for the refreshments. Mom and Cliff were acknowledged for welcoming the attendees. First time visitors were

introduced: Bill, Bob, Irving, Mark, Tod who had his surgery just one week ago, Anita, and Barbara who has been Lynn's nurse for the past 1½ years. Ren reminded the members that he is collecting dues for BOA.

Wendy reminded us that the annual administrative meeting will be the first Sunday in March when we convene again. Last year's minutes as well as BOA's budget will be reviewed, and Youth Rally nominees are accepted. Wendy regretfully informed us that she will be reducing the publication of the *Broward Beacon* to four times per year.

Our speaker for today was introduced. Elizabeth LaFrascia RD, LD/N is a registered dietitian/nutritionist at Memorial Regional Hospital. Elizabeth primarily works with cardiac patients but sees all patient populations on the weekends. Elizabeth started her presentation with the following

Q&A:

- 1) What are probiotics best found in? yogurt
- 2) Microbial cells outnumber human cells in the body by what ratio? 10:1
- 3) Probiotics are found in what vegetables? cruciferous
- 4) The human digestive tract contains around how many types of probiotic bacteria? 400

Elizabeth's explained that what a clinical nutritionist is and how they contribute to medical and health care. They try to find what deficiencies in the diet could be causing a condition or symptom by using diet recall, food frequency, and calorie counts. They identify malnutrition by interview regarding appetite, recent weight loss, temporal indentation, and clavicle bone prominence. They also provide therapeutic and/or preventive diets via Medical Nutrition Therapy (MNT).

Elizabeth's expertise is in clean eating which is defined as eating more of good and less of bad foods, eating more whole foods and less processed and refined foods. This means limiting excess sodium, sugar, and preservatives. The recommended post ostomy diet involves eating small calorically dense meals (6 small meals vs. 3 large meals a day), drinking plenty of water 8 8 oz. glasses, and chewing foods

thoroughly to an almost liquid consistency. Wendy did remind ileostomates that they may require more salt as well as those who sweat excessively during work or work outs.

Elizabeth pulled a dietary intake chart from the Ostomy.org website. The dietary recommendations are listed below with Elizabeth's recommended revisions:

Complex carbohydrates (grains) 6-11 servings daily --- decrease this to 3-6

Vegetables 3-5 servings daily

Fruits 2-4 servings daily

Dairy products 2-3 daily ---- decrease to 1-2; consider lactose intolerance often comes with age and/or after surgery as the enzyme needed to help digest lactose is no longer produced in the body

Meats and proteins 2-3 daily

Limit sweets; healthy fats are back such as what is found in nuts, avocados, olive oil, and salmon.

There was a question about if it is better to count calories or carbohydrates in relationship to portion control. Elizabeth said carbohydrate counting is mostly for the diabetic population; portion control is really a visualization of a serving size. Taste buds can be trained by avoiding the bad foods for a period of time.

Microbiomes are microorganisms (bacteria, viruses, and fungi) that live within or on the body including the intestines. They are often referred to as the second brain. They affect sleep, moods, and energy level. Fiber obtained from one's diet has been found to be the most important. The recommended amount is 25-30 grams per day. Of course, this depends on the type of ostomy and the tolerance of the ostomate to a high fiber diet. Elizabeth told us that depression may be a major cause of digestive stress. Microbiomes are altered by birth control pills and diets such as the Paleo diet (foods that are found naturally in the hunter/gatherer areas). When choosing a probiotic, find one with 100 million to 1 billion live cultures.

Saturated fats are found in any animal protein, so choose leaner meats. Trans fats are artificial fats and are added to increase shelf life – think of those foods found in a vending machine. Avoid anything that has partially hydrogenated oil in the list of

ingredients. Cholesterol is also found naturally in all animal based foods particularly in eggs and shellfish.

Elizabeth named many benefits of clean eating encompassing: Weight loss; Healthy gums and teeth; Shiny hair and strong nails; Increased energy; Feeling of fullness with lower calories; Decreased risk for disease; Better mental health; Better job performance; Better sleep and moods.

She recommended making more foods at home and when trying new things, do so one food at a time and in small amounts.

Elizabeth also provided some recipes and websites for further information.
