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

American Society of Colon & Rectal Surgeons Exhibitor's Hall

One of the potential complications all ostomates face is the possibility of **developing a hernia**. A hernia is an abnormal bulge of intestines or other body parts through a weakness or opening in the wall of

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tissue enclosing them.

A wonderful product manufactured by Cook Medical, the BIODESIGN® PARASTOMAL REINFORCEMENT GRAFT is a parastomal (around the stoma site) reinforcement to help preclude herniation. As their brochure states, "The Biodesign Parastomal Reinforcement Graft can help provide long-term strength around the stoma site. That's because Biodesign remodels as it reinforces, signaling the body to remodel the graft as it supports the abdominal wall. Once remodeling is complete, no Biodesign remains. In its place is patient tissue that provides long-term reinforcement without a permanent material. And unlike dermis-based grafts, Biodesign doesn't leave behind meaningful amounts of elastin that could stretch over time. Benefits: • Circular design facilitates placement and minimizes use of excess material • Various sizes to accommodate differing techniques and patient anatomies • Intuitive pattern promotes ease of use.

"There are two main categories of tissue repair materials: **Synthetic Mesh:** These are sheets of man-made materials that permanently remain in your body. While they offer strength for a repair, they may cause problems. For example: You might be able to feel the mesh in your abdomen, causing discomfort. Synthetic mesh can erode into surrounding tissue or organs, resulting in pain and tissue damage. Your body might respond to synthetic mesh as a foreign material and surround it with scar tissue.

Biologic Grafts: Derived from human or animal tissue, biologic grafts typically allow cells to grow into the graft and replace it—a process called re-

modeling. Some biologic grafts are made from skin tissue, which makes them prone to stretching and bulging. Other biologic grafts are chemically altered to strengthen the material. However, when these grafts are implanted, your body may respond to them as if they were a synthetic mesh.

Biodesign is a next generation biologic graft shown to reduce recurrence rates when compared to other biologics. That's because, once in place the body completely remodels Biodesign into strong, organized tissue. And unlike synthetic mesh, nothing is left permanently in the body to cause problems down the road."

Secca Therapy

Patients should refrain from using NSAIDs for two weeks after the Secca procedure. Patients generally return to normal activities in a few days."

Then it was on to our speaker Melissa Cekay from Coloplast. She showed an interesting video on Elise Sorenson. It all started back in 1954. Nurse Sørensen was concerned by the dramatic change in her sister's lifestyle following an ostomy operation. Thora no longer dared to go out, fearing that her stoma would leak in public.

Elise was determined to help her sister out of her isolation. She came up with the idea of an ostomy bag with an adhesive ring, which would make it fit tightly to the skin. This would prevent leakage and give her sister – and thousands of people like her – the chance to return to their normal life After just two years two thirds of their business was exported from Denmark. Coloplast was born.

Coloplast has a history of working closely with their customers, listening to what they want and responding with new products. You may contact them for free samples of their supplies.

The Brava Elastic Barrier Strips are skin-friendly and alcohol free. Their elastic technology follows the contours of your body to ensure great position and minimizes roll-up of your wafer. These half-moon shaped barriers are compatible with all appliances.



SenSura is the most recent line with one and two-piece systems. They have high output pouches and night pouches. A SenSura Mio is a closed end one-piece system as well as one-piece and two piece drainable pouches that became available the end of March. It has body fit technology, is pliable, molds and conforms to any shape. It moves with you and is comfortable as well as skin friendly.

A few other products are:

Belts - gray to blend well with all skin tones and it is soft for comfort. They come in two sizes. Coloplast's belt loops are attached to the wafer and not to the pouch itself to make changing easier with one-piece disposables pouches in restrooms.

Adhesive Remover Spray - comes in a 1.7 oz can (goes through airport security) and is good to the last drop because new technology allows it to drain completely. It is sting-free and dries quickly.

Strip Paste which can be used to fill in crevices. It is a moldable seal that comes in 2mm and 4.2 mm thicknesses similar to Eakin Cohesive Seals.

Lubricating Deodorant or Sachets - it puts a slick layer inside the pouch for contents to drain more easily.

Coloplast Care Program - is customized to your needs. It is a help-line for questions and problems that is open to every ostomate regardless of the brand they use. The lines are manned by knowledgeable personnel with referrals to WOCN's available. This is where you may ask for free sample products. Call 877-858-2656. For enrollment in the Care Program,

which is geared to meet the needs of new ostomates, you will receive a free travel pouch that has a hook for hanging, scissors, pen, mirror, and a DVD which explains both pouch-changing techniques as well as having interviews with ostomates on an ostomate's life style.

Hollister Ostomy Supplies

John Chickey from Hollister was here to enlighten us. He spent his childhood near Hollister's headquarters and even worked for them at times. He knew he wanted to work with people and help others so when the opportunity arose he joined Hollister's team.

John gave us a new contact and sample request form for *Secure Start* and a 2014 Catalog. *Secure Start* is a complimentary service to support people with ostomies and their caregivers following discharge from the hospital and throughout the continuum of care. Call 888.808.7456. There will be improved services to the Medicaid population, a user friendly website and new products coming up.

A. Formaflex Flange - an integrated floating flange with no pressure to your tummy during application which is so important immediately after surgery. It shapes to give a customized stoma fit and maintains its shape yet has the ability to be reshaped if necessary. It protects the skin, absorbs moisture, has much flexibility, and can be shaped by either

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using a scissors or fingers. You use your fingers to shape by pulling with your thumb and index fingers. The tape boarder has updated adhesive. This does not come in Convexity at this time.

B. Round and Oval **Convex Barrier Rings** come in large, medium and small and create uniform pressure around the stoma. This may be used with convex or flat flanges, the edges are tapered for better creases.

C. Adapt Barrier Rings have no alcohol, are moldable and you may cut and use only a portion and save the rest for later. The packaging is in a brand new clam shell design and is resealable keeping the product fresh.

D. **Urostomy pouches** come in one or two piece systems. An updated version is now also available. The new pouch has three chambers, one in the middle and one on each side giving a flatter profile. The tear drop on the cap can be felt for ease in adjustment (open/closed). They come with a new night drainage adapter that fits the new pouches.

Hollister also has a comprehensive line of **no-sting products**. Adhesive remover wipes, Adhesive remover spray, Medical Adhesive spray and No-Sting Skin Protective Wipes.

More items will be coming out in the future. The one-piece Ileostomy appliance has an updated 'lock and roll' technique. *Quiet Wear* is a new material that is being tested. It has been proven by decibel testing to be the quietest appliance on the market. This material will be used on other pouches.

We enjoyed playing a game with John and he gave out lovely prizes to the winners. Thanks for giving of your time and knowledge.

OstoSolutions

Amy presented us with a Double Feature today. Mary Lou and Johnnie. Johnnie is from Tampa and through his own trials as an ostomate has devised a way to improve the quality of life for others. He has created a product for ostomates to cover the

pouch opening when disposing of it. This keeps it odor and spill proof.

His invention started by using a piece of Eakin Cohesive Seal to cover the hole which



progressed into his creation of a pop-on seal. It can be used with ConvaTec, Hollister, and Coloplast and is 100% odor free when closed to discard the pouch at changing. It allows for more freedom when you are not near a bathroom. These come in three sizes (S, M, and L) and run about .36 cents each. Medicare and insurances do not cover the cost. It is a private pay item for now that can be purchased at www.ostosolultions.com. Thank you Johnnie for thinking out of the box.

Travel and Emergency Preparations

Mary Lou was the other half of our double feature. She spoke on *Travel and Emergency Preparations*. We have to be prepared. Hurricane season is soon upon us with power outages and water shortages. Remember that your supplies are part of your dress code.

Travel - you need to know - What, Amount, and Where. Create a packing list. You should have packets made up with enough supplies for the number of days you will be gone plus two times the normal amount. Use a separate bag for your paste, powder, scissors etc. If you are going on a long trip you may ship your supplies ahead to the hotel you will be at or find a local supplier in advance.

A list of local Ostomy Associations is also good to have. Some airlines allow you to carry a free extra bag for medical supplies.

Check ahead with your airline. Think about the climate, activities and diet changes you will encounter and adjust your supply count. In case you forget something, never fret. Check the local hospitals, yellow pages, and/or UOAA and have your supply information ready.

Hospital Stays and Doctor Visits - bring a kit with your supplies with you along with your medical records. Have your specific product numbers with you. Keep your packets (kit) in an easy to find place at home in case a family member needs to bring it to you.

Hurricane - you may encounter a power outage, flood, evacuation. PREPARE AHEAD. Put supply packets in something waterproof that seals well. You need two weeks worth of supplies along with toilet paper, water for washing, flashlight, hand wipes, mirror, deodorant spray and your important phone numbers.

Emergency Supplies Packing List

Ostomy pouches-enough for two weeks; Hand wipes; Gauze or soft paper towels; Waterproof container or sealable bag; Toilet paper; List of supplies with item numbers and manufacturer (e.g. ConvaTec, Hollister, Coloplast etc.); Baggies for disposal; Deodorant - pouch or spray; Phone number or your supplier; Mirror; Phone number of local suppliers or local hospitals where you will be staying; Flashlight or lantern and batteries; Small bottle of water; and Insurance information.
